




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What to Know When Considering Academy










 Taking a bus to class instead of walking. There is no being late!

- Is **generally curious**, enjoys the subject, and wants to expand content understanding?


- Realizes the value of **note-taking** as a supplement to improving content understanding?







- Collegiate and workplace readiness


Example: Unit 1 -9th Grade
